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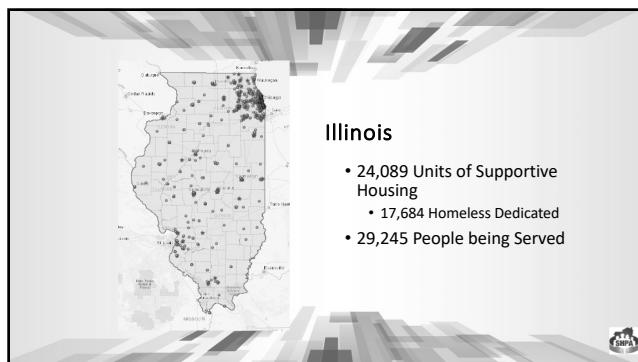
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Supportive Housing Serves

Individuals and families

- Literally or Chronically homeless
- At-Risk of Homelessness
- At-Risk of Unnecessary Institutionalization

People with special needs such as:

- Mental Health
- Substance use disorders
- Developmental or Physical Disabilities
- Chronic illness, such as HIV/AIDS

- Emergency/Crisis Housing
(shelters programs)
- Transitional Housing
- Rapid Re-Housing
- Permanent Supportive Housing





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
What is Permanent Supportive Housing?

HOUSING that is:

- **Permanent:** Not time-limited, not transitional;
- **Affordable:** For people coming out of homelessness and preventing institutionalization
- **Independent:** Tenant holds lease with normal rights and responsibilities.

With **Services** that are:

- **Flexible:** Designed to be responsive to tenants' needs;
- **Voluntary:** Participation is not a condition of tenancy; and
- **Independent:** Focus of services is on maintaining housing stability.



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Supportive Housing Models

- Community-based scattered site rental units (includes SRN)
- Site-Based 100% Supportive Housing
- Multi-units in a single site project
- Group Homes / CILA's
- Single Family Homes

98 Recovery Homes in Illinois

- 1926 total beds

Special Populations

- Women with Children, DCFS involved, HIV, Co-Occurring Disorder, IDOC, Cook County Jail



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Oxford Houses

- Democratically run, self-supporting, alcohol and drug free recovery residence
- Started in 1975 by Oxford House, Inc.
- Since 2011, listed as a best practice by SAMHSA
- For IL residents, importance of Oxford House to member's recovery (1 Unimportant – 5 Important): 4.7

87 Oxford Houses in Illinois

- 704 total beds

Populations

- Men, Women, Women with Children, Men with Children



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Permanent Supportive Housing

- 6 SUPR-funded Permanent Supportive Housing programs across the state
- Eligible applicants are individuals with SUD or COD and low income (preference for income <= 30% of area median income)
- Prioritizing units for youth, women, and women with children
- Provide full range of services from pre-tenancy, to move-in, to ongoing tenancy
- Since April 2022, over 200 people have been housed in these PSH units



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Housing First in SUPR PSH

- Participation in services is voluntary and tenants cannot be evicted for rejecting services
- Housing is not time limited
- Prospective tenants have choice in housing
- Housing is affordable, with tenants paying no more than 30 percent of their gross income toward rent and utilities
- Tenants have choices in the support services that they receive. They are asked about their choices and may choose from a range of services
- As needs change over time, tenants can receive more intensive or less intensive support services without losing their housing.




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Enhanced Recovery Home

- Pregnant & Parenting Person Enhanced Recovery Home
 - Family-like environment
 - Innovative services that focus on well-being of the family
 - Holistic approach that addresses social determinants of health
 - Housing First model



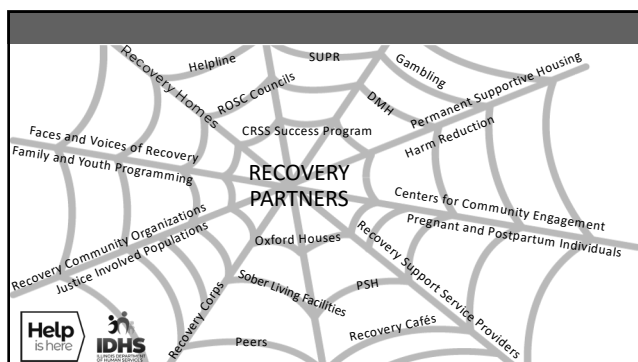
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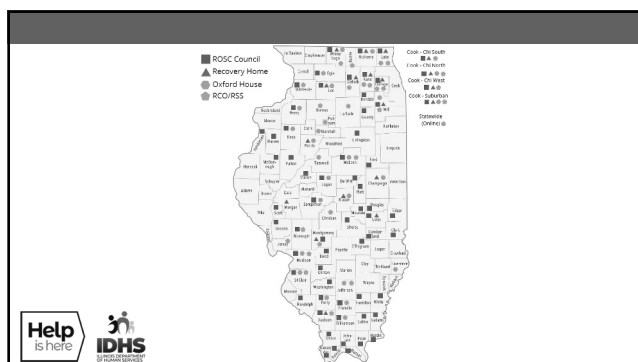
Enhanced Recovery Home

- Improving detection and management of perinatal depression
- Improving maternal and child health outcomes
- Increasing family engagement
- Decreasing housing instability as a barrier to maintaining recovery
- Increasing access to recovery support services including MAR
- Decreasing the number of pregnant and postpartum person overdoses

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

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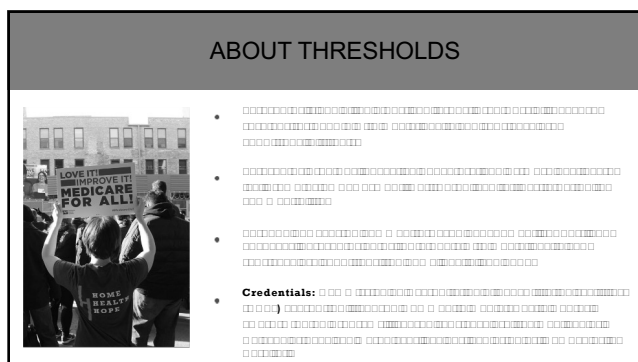
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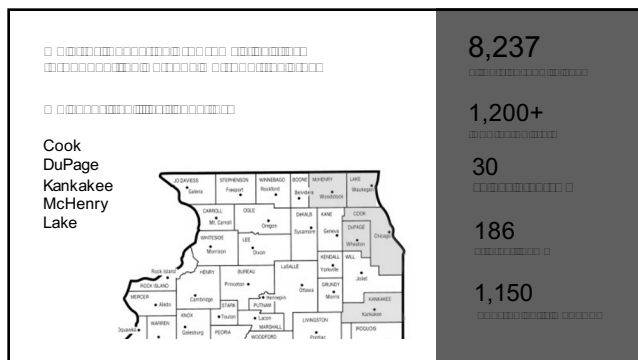
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CLIENTS AT TIME OF ENTRY





Most clients have **at least one** advanced physical health condition.

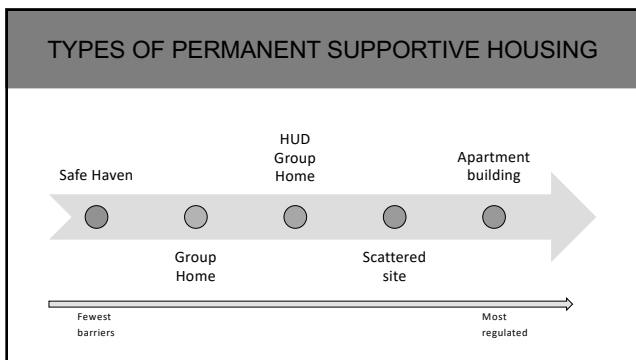
